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Dear Parents

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Welcome back to the summer term, I hope you all had a lovely Easter break. I still haven't had the final Ofsted report following our inspection before the holiday. I am hoping that I will be able to send it home to you early next week – keep checking book bags!

This week in Literacy Class 2 pupils have started a new text called Incredible Edibles. To start the sequence the children made their own sandwiches and then wrote instructions to tell someone else how to make them. They developed lots of cutting skills by slicing cucumber, tomatoes and lettuce as well as practising buttering bread and grating cheese. They then talked about their own sandwich preference which showed us how unique we all are. After that, we started learning the story map for the chocolate eye-ball recipe.

In maths, the KS2 children have been continuing with fractions by thinking about tenths and hundredths. The children practised writing fractions as hundredths and then converting them into decimals while year 6 then turned these decimals into percentages.

Our science units this term are quite different with year 3 and 4 looking at rocks while year 5 and 6 are studying evolution and inheritance. Year 3 and 4 started off by comparing different types of rocks and seeing what they noticed. Year 5 and 6 looked at two different breeds of dog and thought about what the dog might inherit from its parents and which factors could be affected by the environment.

It is super to be able to welcome Mrs Symonds back to school. There is detailed information about what is going on in Class 1 in a separate section later in the newsletter.

Class 1

Once again, there will be lots of learning going on in Class 1 and exciting times ahead for the children as they continue on their learning journey.

Miss Reeve

I'm sure that you will all have met Miss Reeve by now in my absence. Miss Reeve is in her final placement for her PGCE. She will be teaching alongside of me for the next few weeks and has great enthusiasm and ideas which I am sure that the children will enjoy.

<u>EYFS</u>

I am excited that there will be some changes in the way that we plan for our early years pupils this term, which will ensure that the children are able to learn in a way that interests them and takes into account the activities that they enjoy. To this end, you may receive a letter at the end of the week asking for some information about your child's interests as well as a camera to enable you to give us just a snapshot of what your child enjoys doing at home. Don't worry about printing photographs, just send the camera back on the Monday and we will print off the photographs which will form part of your child's learning journey. Your child will then become a 'focus' for that week allowing staff to work more closely with your child during that week. Don't panic if you don't receive a letter, we will focus on a different child each week. All the other children will still learn in the same way – doing what interests them – and will be observed by staff regularly as we would normally do. At the end of your child's focus week we will invite you in to share what we have been up to and the progress that your child has made.

Phonics Check

You may be aware that there is a statutory requirement for Year 1 children to take a phonics assessment in June. The children are working hard in phonics and are used to the format that the assessment will take. They will be unaware that this is a requirement and it will be very low key. However, I would like the opportunity to explain the process to you and answer any questions that you may have. I would invite you to a short meeting on Friday 19th May after our sharing assembly to go over this with you and give you guidance on how you can best help prepare your children at home.

Year 2 SATs

The SATs season is nearly upon us once again and I would like to invite all Year 2 parents to a short workshop to allow me to explain the KS1 SATs to you and allow you to see some of the previous papers. Again, we will let you know which week we will be administering these tests but they will be carried out in a very low-key way so should not cause the children any worry or stress. The workshop will run on Friday 12th May after our sharing assembly.

Request for resources

As part of our enhanced provision we will be creating a mud kitchen in the outside area. There are many reasons for this and the name itself makes it sound exciting. Not only is a kitchen a lovely familiar link to children's own 'home' setting. This sort of familiar, secure play offers up lots of opportunities for co-operative play and interaction as well as a million other things. It is very exciting. To this end we will also have a digging pit which also allows for so many exciting learning opportunities for the children. In order that I can build this, I am looking for some help in the form of about 10 good quality wooden pallets, any old metal kitchenware or wooden utensils for us to create and any old large children's t-shirts to protect the children's school uniform as they play. I am looking at raising money to fund the purchase of waterproof suits so that the children can access the outdoors whatever the weather. I am also looking to build a large sand pit which the children can use to enhance their learning experiences - hence the request for so many wooden pallets. Please could you save any interesting boxes or tubes for our junk modelling area. Finally, we are planning to build an igloo out of 4 pint milk cartons. If you use this size, please could you save the cartons and lids for me – we can store them under the decking. We will need about 100 in total.

<u> P.E.</u>

Miss Reeve and I will be teaching PE outside and on the field as much as possible this term. To that end, can I request that all children have PE kit in school all week. PE will normally be on a Thursday, but this may change due to bad weather or other school activities.

Wellies

Please could all EYFS children have a pair of named wellington boots in school if at all possible. This means that they can go out on the grass if it is wet without ruining school shoes.

Reading Folders

These MUST be in school each day as we hear as many children as we can read each day and change reading books at least weekly.

Water Bottles

As the weather will hopefully soon be warmer, please can you ensure that all children have a NAMED water bottle in school each day. The children are able to drink as they need to – within reason- and it is so much easier if they have their own water bottle.
